Dear Sir,

We have now nearly organized the Third Regiment of Colored Kansans, -- armed[,] uniformed and equipped precisely as other Kansas Regiments. One more will soon be in the field. Col. Williams commands this --(the first) and Jennison will undoubtedly have command of the Colored Brigade. Williams, lately Capt[.] Williams, you will recollect as one of the old "fifty sixes" and as radical antislavery man. John [Dolles?] another of the true men, will be Major, and the company officers will be men of tried and settled principles. I expect to occupy the Lieut. Col's place.

It would afford <u>us</u> great pleasure if our Boston friends would give us an appropriate standard, such as the <u>Era</u> would suggest. We shall be in the field, where you will hear from

us, soon. We expect ours will be the first armed Regiment of Blacks in the service.

I recently Returned from Mississippi in ill health. Was obliged to leave my noble John Brown boys behind. Still they will soon be again on this border I hope. Kansas is imperilled. I think Wendell Phillips will Cooperate with you.
